Free Tuesday night? Check out a Concert in the Park

SHERIDAN — Many towns and cities are hosting summertime concerts in the park these days, but few places can boast the longevity of the Sheridan community concert series. Started by local musician and teacher Bill Avery, the Kendrick Park Summer Concert Series has been a regular part of summer evenings in Sheridan for more than two decades.

Avery saw the park concerts as an opportunity to expose local audiences to the talent of local musicians. The eight-week series continues to prominently feature the Sheridan Concert Band and now incorporates outside acts as well.

"We've been trying to split it up with about four concerts being the Sheridan Concert Band and then four from bands from elsewhere," said David Kuzara, who has been organizing the concert schedule for six years. "At one point they were just from around here but I get them from all over the country now. I enjoy getting the different bands in and see how good of a job I can do, which is a big challenge. Somehow it always manages to come together. My first year I had absolutely no idea what I was doing! I was totally lost! But it is getting easier.

"I do get requests sometimes but mostly I go on the Internet and there is an agent down in Nashville that helps me out," he continued, about how bands are chosen for the series. "We get bands that have been from Las Vegas and Nashville and Minneapolis and Denver and all over."

The concerts, held at the Kendrick Park Band Shell, are always free thanks to First Interstate Bank, the Sheridan Recreation District, donations to the Sheridan Arts Council and to the John and Dorothy Duncan fund, which was set up to support the concert series.

Hearing live music is almost always an enjoyable experience, but the park series offers a unique atmosphere as well. On Tuesday nights, hundreds of individuals and families gather on the expansive green lawn in front of the band shell. They bring chairs, blankets, coolers and picnic baskets to enjoy the evening's music while visiting with friends and neighbors.

"It's one of the very few outdoor concerts, but also one of the few scheduled events that we get to hear the community band and hear friends and family from all around the town come together to play," Kuzara said. "And we

have some excellent musicians here. People really like that. And I think they like the park setting too."

Kuzara said the community band is open to any local musician and generally 30 to 45 people participate at each concert. A different director or pair of directors volunteer for each concert and the director chooses the music that will be performed from the band's extensive sheet music collection.

"When we have the first concert they have rehearsal on Monday a week before the concert and then the day before the concert," Kuzara said. "From then on they come together for one group rehearsal. Sometimes the rehearsals are much harder than the concert!"

Directors for this summer's concerts include Pat Maloney, Don Cherni, Ariel Downing, Andy Edmundson, Diane Knutson and the man who started it all, Bill Avery.

Attendance at the concert series has declined over the past few years, but Kuzara hopes that will turn around.

"There was a time many years ago when there would be 800 to 1,000 people attending, but you know with modern technology, cell-phones and computers, it has dropped off," he said. "Depending on what else is going on that day, we probably have in the neighborhood of between 250 and 450 people."

The concerts begin at 7:30 p.m. every Tuesday night from July 1 to Aug. 19. The full schedule of concerts can be found on the Sheridan Chamber of Commerce website.

Maleficent

From Disney comes Maleficent—the untold story of Disney's most iconic villain from the 1959 classic Sleeping Beauty. A beautiful, pure-hearted young woman, Maleficent has an idyllic life growing up in a peaceable forest kingdom, until one day when an invading army threatens the harmony of the land. Maleficent rises to be the land's fiercest protector, but she ultimately suffers a ruthless betrayal—an act that begins to turn her pure heart to stone. Bent on revenge, Maleficent faces an epic battle with the invading king's successor and, as a result, places a curse upon his newborn infant Aurora. As the child grows, Maleficent realizes that Aurora holds the key to peace in the kingdom—and perhaps to Maleficent's true happiness as well.

It is rated PG for sequences of fan-

tasy action and violence, including frightening images. It has a running time of 1 hour 50 minutes.

The Fault In Our Stars

Hazel and Gus are two extraordinary teenagers who share an acerbic wit, a disdain for the conventional, and a love that sweeps them—and us—on an unforgettable journey. Their relationship is all the more miraculous, given that they met and fell in love at a cancer support group. The Fault in Our Stars, based upon the number-one best selling novel by John Green, explores the funny, thrilling and tragic business of being alive and in love.

It is rated PG 13 for thematic elements, some sexuality and brief strong language. It has a running time of 2 hours 15 minutes.

Edge of Tomorrow

The epic action of Edge of Tomorrow unfolds in a near future in which an alien race has hit the Earth in an unrelenting assault, unbeatable by any military unit in the world. Major William Cage (Tom Cruise) is an officer who has never seen a day of combat when he is unceremoniously dropped into what amounts to a suicide mission. Killed within minutes, Cage now finds himself in-

explicitly thrown into a time loop—forcing him to live out the same brutal combat over and over, fighting and dying again...and again. But with each battle, Cage becomes able to engage the adversaries with increasing skill, alongside Special Forces warrior Rita Vrataski (Emily Blunt). And, as Cage and Rita take the fight to the aliens, each repeated encounter gets them one step closer to defeating the enemy.

It is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of sci-fi action and violence, language and brief suggestive material. It has a running time of 1 hour 50 minutes.

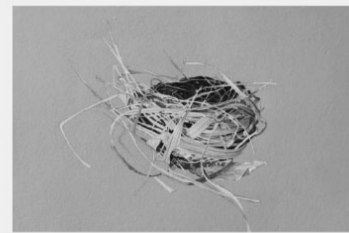
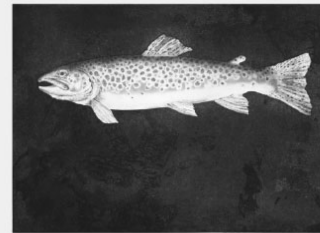

After making their way through high school (twice), big changes are in store for officers Schmidt (Jonah Hill) and Jenko (Channing Tatum) when they go deep undercover at a local college. But when Jenko meets a kindred spirit on the football team, and Schmidt infiltrates the bohemian art major scene, they begin to question their partnership. Now they don't have to just crack the case—they have to figure out if they can have a mature relationship. If these two overgrown adolescents can grow from freshmen into real men, college might be the best thing that ever happened to them.

It is rated R for language throughout, sexual content, drug material, brief nudity and some violence. It has a running time of 2 hours 5 minutes.
